



R7K – The Flamingo Park Neighborhood supports allocating money for a pilot program to reduce flooding in “hotspot” neighborhoods prone to significant flooding. Moreover, the FPNA believes the Flamingo Park neighborhood should be the first neighborhood to receive this flooding mitigation attention due to the numerous streets throughout the neighborhood with flooding issues, the population density of the neighborhood, the concentration of contributing buildings in the neighborhood, and the fact that the larger infrastructure and streetscape projects for the FP neighborhood are not scheduled to begin for a number of years.

R9J – The Flamingo Park Neighborhood Association supports the implementation of the Slow Streets 2.0 program throughout the neighborhood. The FPNA believes that in moving forward with the program, the City should explore all options, including signage (similar to what existed on the planters and bollards) and physical modifications (speed humps and street/intersection design) in order to achieve the goals of program. The current design of slow streets, textured street markings, has been a step backwards as the markings are difficult to read until a car is virtually on top of it, and the texture is not perceptible to a car driving over it.

HOURS OF SALE FOR ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES – The FPNA reiterates its resolution passed at our February 2022 meeting –

Because of the adjacent residential neighborhood, the Flamingo Park Neighborhood Association believes the cut off time for the serving of alcoholic beverages should be 2 AM for Washington Avenue. In any case, any restrictions implemented on Ocean Drive and Collins Avenue must apply to Washington Avenue as well. If Washington Avenue has later closing hours and less restrictive rules, it would just move the problem the City is trying to address closer to the residential neighborhood.
